THE NEXT SCHEDULED BOARD MEETING: Monday, November 18, 2024, 5PM

The Board of Trustees of the Ericson Public Library met in regular session on Monday, September 16, 2024 at 5:00 p.m. at the library.

Those present were: Levi Baber, Michael Carr, Lowell Davis, Sarah Dvorsky, Heather Frese, Barbara Madson, Rachel McKenny, and Barb Rardin. Absent: Sue Gradoville. The meeting was called to order by Frese at 5:00 p.m. There was a quorum present.

The August 19, 2024 meeting minutes were presented by Williams. A motion to approve minutes was made by Rardin and seconded by Carr, motion carried unanimously.

The Director's report contained the following items for September 2024:

- 1. The circulation for August was 13,254. Computer usage was 817, Wi-fi usage was 1,169 sessions and we had 2,327 visits to our website. The meeting rooms were reserved 34 times.
- The library received a donation of \$25 from Kathleen Hakanson and a \$35 memorial for Jan Kinne from Jane Cook. \$322 was deposited from Library sales and \$112 in desk donations. The library also received the contract and payment from Pilot Mound for \$413.53.
- 3. Don't forget we have our Library survey out and to get yours submitted and let others know about it before October 1st. We have currently around 60 responses. It would be great to have at least 200! I will do a push on the community page with the direct link so that it coincides with the newsletter and letting folks know that they can submit it online versus filling out the paper copy.
- 4. Re-Accreditation updates. With this process we will need to schedule the Building and Grounds committee to do a walk through with Mike Slight for our Building and grounds checklist. It is probably more of a confirmation of the documentation/material we submitted in 2019 with any noted changes. I estimate it to take an hour. The annual review of the Director is also apart of accreditation so the Personnel committee has been given the evaluation forms to begin the annual review too. With this last submission of policy sections 5 and 6 we complete our review of policies! We also need board education, which I've sprinkled in articles, updates, videos, and included a project that we are partnering with ISU Extension and Outreach on called *Launchpad to tomorrow*.
- 5. Our Activating Community Voices is gearing up for more programming and discussing possible themes and topics this upcoming year to address DEI and inequality issues. If any board members are interested in attending these stakeholder meetings, please let me know and we can add you to our list!
- 6. We have been awarded \$6,000 in a Rotary grant to implement Little Engines, a literacy project with the preschool programs in the Boone Schools, public and private. We were also encouraged to apply for a state BooST grant to add to this project funding

and was awarded an additional \$8,000. This project with include providing books to preschoolers and their families along with literacy activities to encourage literacy at home. We are also planning programming here in the library to encourage library usage and get preschoolers and their families more active and involved in reading and the library.

- 7. The Friends of the Ericson Public Library have a new **fun**draising opportunity coming up at the end of October, called Haunted Library. They will host a spooky Halloweenish event here at the library on October 26th. There are two ways to participate. One is through a general admission ticket with includes a scavenger hunt and a second way is through a VIP ticket which includes an escape room opportunity. This is the first year of this type of event as they were looking for something different than trivia. I know they are looking for volunteers to help so if you have time and want to see how the Friends help the library through fun events and fundraising, contact Jessica Baber. Or make sure you get a ticket for a fun filled spooky time! There will be an afterhours at Bottled Bliss. Keep your eyes posted for upcoming details!
- 8. The State Library annual survey for FY23/24 is mostly finished. I'm noting that we continue our trend of utilizing grants and donations at the same high rate as last year. Total circ and library usage is up from last year which is great news. I will submit the survey and then create an annual report to publish and present at the next Board and Council meeting!

A motion to accept the Director's report was made by Carr and seconded by McKenny and carried unanimously.

The financial reports for September were examined and filed. A motion approving the financial reports and payment of warrants was made by Baber and seconded by Madson and carried unanimously.

Under old business Williams provided an update to the grants the library currently has or continues to apply for. Restrictions, amounts, processes and items they fund was discussed in detail.

Under new business Williams presented revisions and updates to sections 5 and 6 of the policy manual. Discussion ensued with a recommended change to the add a statement about following internet use guidelines to our hotspots policy and to also update the salaries to be more in line with current salary was made by Baber. A motion to approve Baber's recommendations and all revisions as written was made by Carr and seconded by Rardin and carried unanimously. This completes the policy revisions! Williams requested input from Trustees for the the Building and Grounds committee for them when they update the CIP list and priorities. Williams will set up a time with committee to discuss. Williams provided an update for Trustees regarding the ending of SILO, the State Library email service ending May 1st. Williams is evaluating options with Andy and is considering either moving to city's server, google workspace or Microsoft.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:25 p.m. on a motion by Rardin and seconded by Carr and carried unanimously.

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

What an incredible year it has been! After fifteen years of serving this library and community, I can confidently say this year ranks at the top! While it's challenging to pinpoint a single reason, there seems to be an abundance of activity, excitement and even more to look forward to!

Doing this work has been a true joy, and I'm excited to continue offering new services, programs, and resources that provide extraordinary opportunities for our community. I genuinely believe this library is a vital asset to the people of Boone as I get to see it every day we make a difference. I take great pride in our library's accomplishments and eagerly anticipate finding solutions to the challenges we face as a library and as a community. The annual report showcases stories and highlights statistics, and insights about our current status and future direction.

As always, my primary goal is to create a meaningful impact through our services and programs. The effects of our work can be seen daily; we transform, adapt, and shape services based on the needs of our community. A significant focus for our library staff and Board is determining how we can be more responsive to our community. Community engagement is a priority for us, often facilitated through partnerships, as we are a small team. Collaborating with engaged partners allows us to expand our reach and effectiveness. Over the past fiscal year, we have diligently worked to identify ways to enhance our relevance within partner organizations to create a greater impact.

In FY24, we received grants for technology workshops, digitized the Boone News Republican, and planned for a book bike in the spring! We provided cultural and STEM programming, legal and tax assistance, resource-sharing activities, and conducted 96 outreach visits, reaching 3,332 people. We added various new programs like Books and Bites to reach out to our teens at the High School, and participated in Middle School club days to allow us to reach kids to provide engaging activities. Fun events like Bridgerton Garden Party, Concerts, Summer Reading Carnival, meet and greet with Rapunzel or a pizza party with a Ninja Turtle and ERICON drew people into the library for something unexpected. Our programs educated the community about available services, fostering connections. We hosted story times, stitch nights, and craft series, emphasizing wellbeing and mental health through activities like walking clubs, gratitude journaling, yoga, and meditation. Our Library's plan continues to quide our priorities and enhance services!

THE IMPACT

With a strong focus on our Library's goals we continue to accomplish more to impact our community and hope to continue this trend to FY25!

ACCESSIBILITY | CONNECTION | TECHNOLOGY GOALS

We upgraded our printer in FY24 to enhance printing capabilities and offered more convenient ways for our patrons to print directly from their devices. This allowed patrons to walk into the library and send their print jobs easily and conveniently- saving time and money! We increased access to online library services by providing user-friendly web and library catalog enhancements, and we also increased awareness of library technology offerings. Hotspot checkouts continue to be popular, and we replaced a couple of outdated units with new ones. Another way we addressed technology goals was by digitizing more content from our local newspaper from 2007 to 2023. Increased access to digital content allows not only those in our community to research the collection from anywhere but also those outside of the library walls. Boone Newspapers from 1865 to 1926, and 2007 to 2023 are available in a fully searchable database from our website! Give it a try! We also offered technology workshops to help seniors and those wanting to learn more about how to use technology!

EDUCATION | LEARNING | WELLBEING GOALS

Libraries are an essential community hub bringing people together for a variety of activities and events. While we provide our community with a variety of programming, like book clubs, writers workshops and wellness programs, Activating Community Voices focused on mental health and the Wisdom Corridor project in FY24. This group, comprised of sixteen partners, continued to focus on immersive and educational learning experiences to understand dimensions of equity. It is a crucial strategy for fostering inclusive and engaged communities. Libraries play a critical role in promoting community health and wellbeing. Not only did we have great participation, we helped build meaningful connections in the community and awareness of programs, which increased community building and conversations to spark more informed and engaged citizens!




SPACES | GOALS

We upgraded our security system and also addressed building enhancements to ensure that our facilities are welcoming, comfortable and safer than ever.

We evaluated and updated our meeting room spaces to the fullest extent. We currently offer four spaces to be reserved by the public for meetings.
